

State Managed Well Plugging Update

The Railroad Commission administers Texas' state managed well plugging program. Although most non-productive oil and gas wells are plugged by responsible actors, RRC's well plugging program works to eliminate the safety and environmental risks associated with abandoned wells. This program is funded entirely through fees paid to RRC by the oil and gas industry.






This unsecured, abandoned well in Rains County was at risk of leaking potent levels of H2S, a lethal gas. Due to the high hazards associated with this well, and its proximity to homes in the area, RRC timely plugged the well in February 2019. The total cost to plug this well was \$1,019,878.



This leaking, abandoned well in Dimmit County was secured by the RRC in July 2018 to stop and remediate the oil pollution. This well is classified as a Priority 1 within the RRC's well plugging priority system due to its threat to public safety and the environment. Now that the well is secured and no longer leaking, it will be plugged in May 2019.
